Industry Tours

- 1. Bridgestone Des Moines Plant The Bridgestone plant is the largest ag tire manufacturing facility and supplies a significant percentage of the original equipment and replacement tires in the global ag market. The facility also builds forestry and construction tires. You will see tire mixing, curing, and tire building. Terms and Conditions: Participants working at competing tire companies cannot participate. Everyone must sign a non-disclosure agreement before going in to the plant. Names and places of employment required. Safety equipment must be worn. Must wear flat, closed toe shoes. No cameras or cell phones allowed. If you are unable to walk, let Farm Bureau know so that Bridgestone can make accommodations.
- 2. Des Moines Water Works Plant DMWW is an independently operated, public utility providing drinking water to approximately 500,000 people in the Greater Des Moines area. DMWW is the largest water utility in Iowa, among the largest 100 utilities in the country and is recognized as an industry leader. This tour includes their state-of-the-art laboratory, Filter Building, and Pumping Station. You will learn and discuss how DMWW is a surface water provider receiving water from the Raccoon and Des Moines Rivers and treating it appropriately in order to deliver safe finished water. Tours involve walking in a plant environment and outside conditions. Comfortable walking shoes and appropriate clothing for both indoors and outdoors are required. Each participant must show photo identification to the security guard.
- 3. Hawkeye Breeders Services Going into a rapidly changing and very exciting future for reproduction options in the cattle industry, the new generation of Hawkeye Breeders is making sure everything possible is being done to ensure the best possible AI and ET results with the use of our semen. Hawkeye Breeders has continued to grow by incorporating the latest technology and techniques to make sure breeders can feel confident that when they use a straw of Hawkeye semen, they will have the best possible chance of conception and getting the calves they need on the ground to keep their cattle program on track.
- 4. John Deere Des Moines Works Go behind the scenes to see how our biggest machines are brought to life in some of the most modern and efficient factories in the world. Our tour guides will take you through each stage of the manufacturing process, explaining how all the pieces come together to create these massive green machines. John Deere Des Moines Works manufactures self-propelled sprayers, cotton pickers, tillage equipment, and grain drills. No video cameras, cell phones, open-toed shoes or sandals allowed.
- 5. Market to Market Live Studio As a live studio audience, join Mike Pearson in the filming of an episode of Market to Market. Mike is from Grinnell, Iowa and is both a business man and a farmer. He follows in the footsteps of his father, Mark Pearson, as the new host of Market to Market. See firsthand what it takes to film a show that covers the over \$100 billion business of food, and those issue affecting the 56 million citizens of rural America.

Young Farmer Discussion Meet







The Discussion Meet is a free-wheeling discussion of ag topics, as if you are sitting around the table discussing a problem. The Discussion Meet helps you build communication skills, develop an understanding of important ag issues and explore how to pool knowledge to solve problems. Successful participants are productive thinkers rather than emotional persuaders, help the group create ways to implement the solutions discussed, and highlight Farm Bureau's involvement in those actions.

Two of the following questions will be selected for the preliminary rounds of the 2017 Discussion Meet:

- 1. Farm Bureau policy supports expanding international markets through free trade agreements (such as the Trans Pacific Partnership). What role do farmers have in helping lawmakers and the general public understand the importance of trade to agriculture and to lowa's economy?
- 2. Farm Bureau policy supports voluntary adoption of conservation practices. The Iowa Nutrient Reduction Strategy, in place since 2013, is estimated to cost between \$77 million and \$1.2 billion annually to implement. How can we make meaningful progress in achieving the goals laid out in the strategy? Consider:
 - Which practices do you use and don't use, and why?
 - Willingness to use cost-share dollars, or not, and why?
 - · How to influence farmers to participate
 - Value of working in a watershed
 - Building public support
- 3. Young farmers face many challenges starting and growing their farming operation. What are some options young farmers of today must consider in order to stay in farming/agriculture for years to come? What role could an organization like Farm Bureau play in helping young farmers succeed? Consider:
 - Diversification
 - Succession planning
 - Technology
 - Policy

Participants complete in two rounds, each addressing one of these questions. Three to seven young farmers participate in each room. The format is: a 30 second opening statement, 25 minutes of group discussion, and a 60 second closing statement.

Contestants are judged on cooperative attitude, problem solving, delivery, problem analysis and opening and closing statements. Based on cumulative ranking, the top eight finalists (and two alternates) will be determined.

Finalists receive coaching throughout the year to prepare for the final rounds, held during the Iowa Farm Bureau Annual Meeting in December 2017. Questions for the final rounds will be selected from the five questions provided by AFBF.



Prizes are awarded to four state finalists. The winner receives a John Deere X380 Riding Lawn Mower and will advance to the AFBF Discussion Meet in January, 2018 in Nashville, TN.

Sign up for the Discussion Meet during the Young Farmer Conference. You must be 35 years or younger as of Jan. 31, 2018 and be a regular member in good standing of your county Farm Bureau.
