Minor Farm License

Individuals under the age of 16 are currently unable to drive, unsupervised by an adult, for farm purposes. The following chart lays out the current Iowa driver license law for minors.

Kansas, Minnesota, New Jersey, and Washington all have special licenses allowing minors to operate a motor vehicle for farm purposes without an accompanying adult. All of the states with juvenile farm licenses, require the individual to pass a driving test or driver education course before obtaining the license.

Age of eligibility varies greatly ranging from no minimum age in Washington to 16 or 17 years old in New Jersey. Who qualified for a farm license also depends on the state. Minnesota allows a minor to operate a vehicle solely for "assisting the person's parents or guardians with farm work." The limitation prevents a minor farmhand from operating a vehicle for their employer. Kansas chose to extend the privilege to individuals who "resides upon a farm" or who are "employed for compensation upon a farm." Many states have implemented distance restrictions to minor farm drivers. Minnesota requires the driver to remain within a 20 miles radius of the farm home and in cities with a population of fewer than 100,000 people. Washington requires the driver to provide a map outlining the farm, roads, silos, and fields where the minor will be driving to the state driver license office.
